Course Description:

This course is a survey of the history of Christianity in China. Since Buddhism is recognized as a "Chinese religion", Christianity in its various forms is now the largest "foreign religion" in China and has special significance in the relationship between China and other countries. For this reason, the study of the history of Christianity in China constitutes an important basis for understanding the history of the relationship between China and other countries. Through a systematic study of this history, students will acquire knowledge of Christianity and its enculturation in China, including the four periods of Christian development in China:

- the so-called Nestorian mission from the 7th to 9th centuries during the Tang dynasty,
- the "Nestorian" and Franciscan missions under the Yuan Mongol dynasty (1264-1368),
- the Jesuit and other Catholic missions of the late Ming and early Qing dynasties (1368-1774)
- and the Christian mission in general since the 19th century.

Course Outcomes:

This course will help students to grasp the reasons for the ups and downs of Christian missions in China and to realize the sensitivity and importance of Christianity in China. With this knowledge students should gain a deeper appreciation of Chinese culture and a better understanding of the similarities and differences between China and Western countries.

Course Requirements and Form of Assessment:

During the course there will be one short paper (no less than 4 pages), and one longer final paper (no less than 10 pages). The short paper average will count for 20% of the final grade. The final paper will count for 60% of the final grade. The course also requires each student to have at least one oral presentation. Class participation and oral presentations will count for 20% of the grade.

Late paper policy: The late paper will result in a full grade reduction for the course.

Attendance Policy:

There are NO unexcused absences in this class. Students are expected to attend every class. Students are allowed 2 EXCUSED absences, which require a written medical excuse or written approval from Dean Russell Leigh Moses at the TBC administration offices, and may reflect adversely on the final grade.
